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# **HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHT**

### **Franklin Schools**

In 1827, the Michigan Territorial Council made townships responsible for the education of their residents. Townships with at least 50 families were to employ a schoolmaster.

The log cabin schoolhouse: First school in Southfield Township

In the summer of 1828, thirty children from the small farming and milling village passed through the double doors of a log cabin schoolhouse. It was erected in the same location as the police station. The land was donated by Elijah Bullock, the second landowner in the village.

Sophie Gotie, the first teacher, spent six weeks during the summer with the children. The following summer, Eliza Fuller taught in the log school.

By 1830, children were spending winter months in school. Morgan Wisner and Ira Wisner were brothers of Moses who would become Michigan's governor. John Robinson, their brother-in-law also taught here. Men were employed in the winter to teach because it was thought that they could better control the boisterous, unruly male students.

The school was built on land originally owned by Dillucene Stoughton, the first landowner in the village. As enrollment increased, there was a need to build a larger school. Today, the building is a residence.

## The Brick School: circa 1869

Albert Rust, a merchant, donated land for the brick school. It would serve the community until the winter of 1922 when it burned down.

The Franklin school: a landmark for over 100 years!

While this structure was being built, children had classes upstairs in the Brick store. Franklin consolidated with Birmingham schools in the late 1970's.




#### **Cemetery Memorial Day**
